I want to share with you some reflections on the impact of FPWC's mission to help Warren County homeless families since 1998. In September 2023 FPWC will complete its 25th year serving Warren County homeless families.

Some were surprised to learn that there really were homeless families in Warren County. What has surprised me is that most of our guests are children in the newborn to 6 age-group. In fact, our very first guest in 1998 was a pregnant woman. She did not give birth while she was our guest; however, several children have been welcomed into this world while their family was a guest in our shelter program.

Another surprise was hearing that for at least one child, being in the shelter program was the happiest time he could remember--the power of having good food and a warm bed.

And one more good memory: one child returned to the office to share with Miss Linda that he/she was graduating from high school and planning to attend college. The young person attributed his/her success to the encouragement and direction from FPWC staff and volunteers.

FPWC's mission is to assist families experiencing homelessness in Warren County, Ohio, to achieve sustainable independence through a community- based response. FPWC's vision is to have a county where every family has a home, a livelihood, and a future full of promise.

FPWC accomplishes its mission and vision by working with hundreds of volunteers from faith congregations, businesses, civic organizations, and individuals who want to help Family Promise serve families in the crisis of homelessness.

My mother worked many years as an RN and Supervisor in a long-term care facility. She shared with the family that the most important value she had was to treat her patients with dignity. I value the many gifts that my parents instilled in my brother, sister, and me in our growing up years. They taught us the value of family; often reminding us of how important our relationship as siblings is. They taught us the value of hard work, responsibility, and accountability. They were strong in their faith. I would like to say that John, Laurie, and I learned those values well and now share them with our children and our grandchildren. We take those values into this world, and we walk the walk; or at least we do our best to do so.

This year Family Promise of Warren County has experienced much growth. In March, as you are aware, we purchased the former Shaker Inn. We went out on faith to make this purchase with the intent that this facility would give us the opportunity to double our capacity, to fill the ever growing need to assist families who are experiencing the crisis of homelessness.

We have been so blessed along our journey to work with so many volunteers from all walks of life that have embraced the vision. Individuals, church groups, businesses, high school classes, organizations of all sorts, neighbors and many more have asked "What do you need?" and "How can we help?". Our volunteers once again proved to be the backbone of our renovation. For this we are so grateful.

And the guest rooms...Oh my! How do I even begin to express the heartfelt gratitude for those volunteers that have made those rooms not just a place to stay but a place of hope, growth, family, love, and dignity.

Thank you so much for providing my family with groceries, dinner, snacks to ensure we don't go hungry while we are navigating our housing hardship. Your selflessness and generosity resonate through our family and we are brought comfort in knowing that you care! I have not had sloppy joe in quite some time, so opening that up on Sunday brought on big smiles. So delicious! The kids have made a hefty dent in the froot loops, muffins, chips, and cookies too!

You all are awesome and we are grateful for all you do. During a time when it can be pretty tricky to feel optimistic, the extension of your compassion to us most certainly makes those tricky moments less frequent.

I recently had the opportunity to reconnect with Ashleh. She and her son stayed with Family Promise of Warren County in 2017 when we were IHNWC. (See her article in this newsletter.) As she and her work supervisor Chris toured the new facility, Ashleh shared that as a child, she and her sister and mother stayed in room 30 at the Shaker Inn while they saved enough money to move into an apartment. I watched her as she smiled with wide eyes, somewhat emotional as she viewed each completed room and the partially completed room 30 as well as the rest of the building. I asked Ashleh what she thought, and she replied, "these rooms will give hope and dignity to the families that stay here". Hope and Dignity... powerful words indeded!

Family Promise of Warren County was built on Family, Hard Work, Responsibility, Accountability, Faith, Hope and yes, Dignity. These are indeed the cornerstones of success. Families come to us with nothing. Sad, deflated, feeling unworthy and in need of the love and support that our volunteers so openly give of themselves. The families willingly take the advice of staff so that they can move onward and upward to housing and self-sufficiency so that they can never be in the crisis of homelessness again.

My 1 yr. old son and I arrived at Interfaith on a Sunday afternoon, as we were instructed to by phone. I was 22 at the time, but on that day, I felt like a young child pretending to be an adult. As I walked up to the front door, with Noah in my arms, I had so many fears of the unknown, that I almost turned back around. It wasn't until later, when a sweet secretary handed me a welcome basket full of knitted blankets and toiletries, that I really started to calm down. I remember I was upstairs putting Noah's and my few belongings in an assigned cubby when she brought up the much-needed items. Even though I had just gotten a job as a part-time cashier, I was struggling to provide as a newly-single mom. Tears of gratitude rolled down my cheeks as I looked though the basket, and then tucked it away in the cubby.

At that time, I had no idea of the countless blessings I'd be receiving over the next couple months. The dinners, uplifting conversations, and cozy rooms that the area churches provided filled up my stomach and soul each week. On my off days, staff at Interfaith would help me sign up for housing, daycare, food stamps, college, etc. My favorite was Sheila, as she would always have the brightest smile and sweetest greetings when I got back from work each day. Andrew spent hours one day helping me with my FAFSA for college, because of technical errors and a time crunch. Most of my growth happened during talks with Linda though. She always told me how proud she was of me, and it usually caught me off guard. I was so focused on my past failures and broken relationships, that I could barely see all the progress that I was making. One day she told me something that will always stay with me: "I think you would make a great lawyer. I really believe you could." It absolutely amazed me that someone who barely knew me believed I could be something great. Linda, you truly gave me back my drive to not become another statistic.

Well, I am not a lawyer today, but 8 years later I am finally proud of who I am becoming. This past July, I married a man who would never intentionally harm me. My husband Daniel's love for me is unconditional. After two very unhealthy relationships, I didn't know if I could ever be a wife. It's still hard to believe sometimes that I will forever be Mrs. Hargis. Daniel, Noah, and I were a trio from January 2017 until June 2021, when my husband and I had our youngest Rayfe. I am now a blessed Momma of two boys. Professionally, I am the Benefits and Wellness Coordinator for a multi-state Child-Welfare Agency called Necco. Most importantly, I am a child of God. Without His strength, I would have never walked through Interfaith's doors or made it this far. Thank you to those I mentioned, as well as the many names unmentioned that made Noah's and my time at Interfaith life-changing! We are forever grateful!

Coordinator Corner

I am Jennifer Keezer. I have been the lead coordinator for Resurrection Lutheran Church (RLC) in Lebanon, Ohio, for the last twenty years. RLC has been participating in Family Promise since the inception. They began as a support church, providing meals and both evening and overnight hosts for the first year. RLC began being a host church because they saw the need for shelter four times a year for the families.

Due to the fact that our program is so long running, we may do things differently from other churches. For example, we have a cocoordinator, Dave Moran, who recruits the volunteers and schedules the meals. Each person that volunteers provides the entire meal. Breakfast and lunch items are purchased for the week by an individual. One of the rules at RLC is that each child must try a bite of everything. This week RLC is providing the meals, and this rule is paying off, because according to Nicole at Family Promise, the kids have eaten everything so far this week and enjoyed it. One meal is something they have never had before, sausage casserole. It's a perfect way to start Thanksgiving week.

RLC provides the breakfast and lunch items for the week in laundry baskets. Each family receives two new laundry baskets. To RLC this doesn't seem to be a big deal, but the families are grateful for the baskets. One mom shared she was in tears of gratitude knowing she didn't have to cart laundry in plastic bags any longer. The families are always grateful for things that many take for granted.

With the drastic changes that COVID made, we no longer have the connection to the families that we long for nor see the smiling faces and the hugs. I miss the personal touch.

As a coordinator, I am very excited about the new Family Promise campus, which provides interim housing for the families. As soon as hosting on site begins again, I look forward to once again getting to know the

families personally.

1. What do you usually do to volunteer for FPWC? Which is your favorite?

I answer phones and write thank you notes for donations and to the churches for hosting. As for a favorite, I like doing all of it.

- 2. How did you first get involved in FPWC? I was looking for a volunteer opportunity and had heard about IHNWC through other organizations where I had volunteered so I called and spoke to Linda, set up an appointment to meet her and started working Tuesday afternoons in May of 2013.

- 4. Tell us a little about your family.


