## Linda's Letter

As I am writing this letter to you, I am in awe of the amazing work that was accomplished in the last 12 months. On December 15, 2023, the Family Promise of Warren County staff moved into our new offices at the new campus, the former Shaker Inn. We all realized on that day the numerous possibilities that were made available to the community by so many volunteers that transformed this place into a place where families would have dignity in their journey from homelessness to self-sufficiency and housing.

We also realized that the renovations were not quite complete and ready for our families to safely join us. When the initial work

was completed, we welcomed our first five families on April 21, 2024. I will never forget their joy

through their fear as they walked over the threshold of their rooms. The joy when they found out that they could do normal things like laundry. The relief that their children would be fed. And the smiles as they enjoyed family time with the volunteers at Sycamore Presbyterian Church who treated them like their own families.

In July 2024 we opened our playground, Avery's Place. The children are often seen happily swinging on the swings, climbing on the play-set, and sliding down the slides. These children (and I dare say an adult or two) are able to release their concerns of the day and just relax before they address housing and self-sufficiency during their stay.

We have enjoyed families from all backgrounds. More grandparents this year than in several prior years. More teenagers as well who still, with the care of volunteers, attended prom and ball games and homecoming – just as they should. Homelessness should not and will not ever interrupt these rights of passage.

We have housed single fathers with children, single mothers with their children and couples

with children. We have even housed a recent veteran, who you will read about later in this newsletter. Michael, a proud Marine, and his family came to FPWC as a last resort. How can homelessness come to one of our nation's veterans? Yet it did. In this time of challenge, Michael found very sustainable employment and his family found a place to breathe amongst the chaos of their life. A place of support. And staff and volunteers alike enjoyed little 3-year-old Addie as she grabbed the shirt of any adult in her circle, looked into their eyes, and lovingly said, "tome here Grandma, let's play".

THIS is Family Promise of Warren County at its best. And this scenario has played out daily, weekly, and monthly ever since our inception in 1998 and in our new surroundings. Love abounds. Genuine concern abounds. Unconditional love abounds. I share with you the photo above which was captured by our security camera. Three children playing in our playroom with several stuffed animal friends. This photo brought back so many memories to me as my son and daughter played much the same way as children – maybe with a certain guinea pig or two involved!! In our household, it was Katy, holding court as a teacher (which she eventually became). Those stuffed animals and her brother, Andrew and others were her classroom, and goodness knows what lessons she was teaching.

The glory of this photo is who is the homeless child? It is impossible to tell, isn't it? And that is the point. At FPWC, our children are not set aside as different; as homeless. They are loved for who they are, in the playroom where they are. It is YOU, our volunteers and

our donors who allow this work to be done and who do this wonderful work of loving one another.

As we walk into 2025 there is much more work to be done. There are more Michael's, and more Addie's and more Paisley's that we need to open our doors to. We need to build our foundation of congregations, business and organizations that will allow us to double our network in the summer of 2025.

No child should sleep in a car or in any place not meant for human habitation. None of us should allow that. With this new campus, the possibilities are endless, and I look forward to building our space at this campus to welcome those that we are called to help.

Thank you for joining my staff, the Family Promise Board of Directors, and our current volunteers on this journey with your gifts of time and donations. I promise it is a journey that will transform you. I know this as it has transformed me.

## Stories of Promise

My husband was recently honorably discharged from the US Marine Corps after serving 5 years. After we moved back to Ohio, he struggled to obtain a job that would sustain our family of four. This was due to waiting for his aircraft license paperwork to transfer from military to civilian.

During this time of waiting for everything to process and transition, we found ourselves struggling to find housing. Feeling helpless and at a loss we were told about Family Promise. Once we came in contact with them, Mischelle, the Case Manager, quickly got back with us and brought us into shelter within a week. From the start all the staff and volunteers were welcoming, comforting, and non-judgmental.

Everyone truly makes you feel at home. My family and I could not be more shocked at how wonderful this program is.

Each family is given their own room with new and very comfortable furniture, ours was amazing and provided us with our own safe space. You are given supplies, kids' toys, and anything else you may need to sustain

normal living. During our stay here they even threw our daughter her third birthday party. It was complete with gifts, games, cake, and party favors.

Each night a church provides a delicious home cooked meal for all the families and provides an activity for the kids to enjoy after dinner. Stepping into Family Promise you would never know it was a "homeless shelter."

While we were in shelter, my husband Michael, was able to obtain an amazing job position as an Aircraft Mechanic where he will continue his career path he started in the military. Additionally, we were able to obtain a 3-bedroom apartment for our family (*pictured above: first family meal in our new home*). We don't think we could have made it this far without the support and resources provided to us from everyone.

This program gave my family housing, food, supplies, and support when we didn't have any. For that, we will be forever thankful and appreciative for ALL the staff and volunteers at Family Promise of Warren County.





## A Letter From The Treasurer

I want to express my sincere thanks to all our gracious donors! You have helped Family Promise of Warren County to purchase our new facility and make \$697,500.00 in renovations and improvements. As you can imagine, the building (the former Shaker Inn) having been built in 1948 had much work to be done for our families and staff to safely move in!

Shifting to a static site homeless shelter from our previous model of rotating from congregation to congregation each week comes with substantial operation costs. In addition to the need for additional staffing to address the ever-growing need, we now have a mortgage, increased utility payments as well as building repairs, maintenance, and grounds-keeping costs.

While our capital campaign focus has been on the acquisition and renovation of the new facility, I would like to ask for your prayerful consideration to help us

sustain our operations. Your generous donation or pledge of a monthly contribution will help to assist FPWC to cover our monthly expenses.

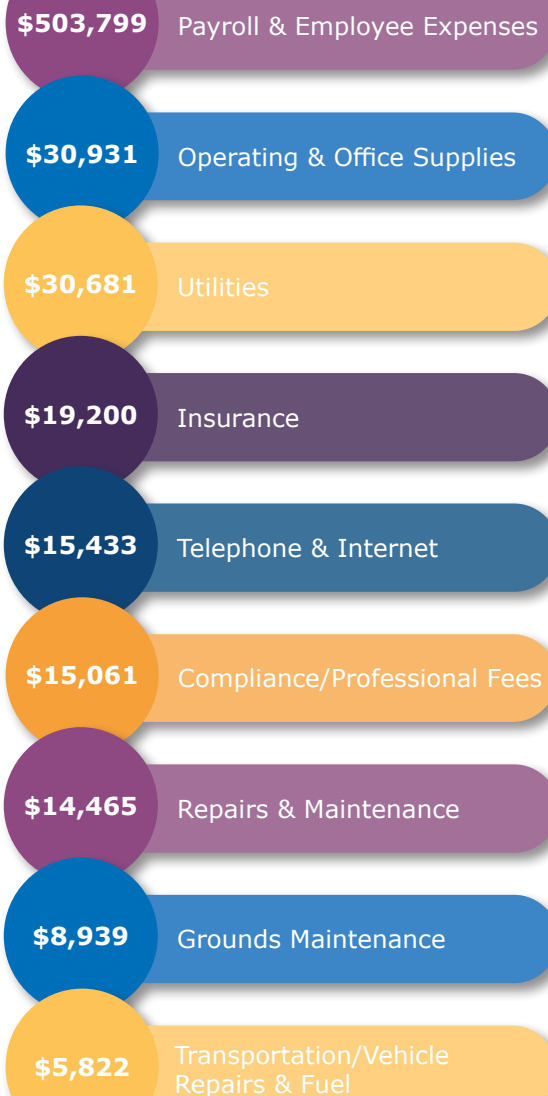
Family Promise of Warren County, since our inception in September 1998, takes pride in being a good steward of your contributions and we pledge to always be. the kids, and engage in fellowship with the parents for the week every evening. Witnessing firsthand what Family Promise of Warren County does for people in our community was so heartwarming. These families are given such great support to get back on their feet and out of homelessness. The work that the staff at FPWC do there is simply amazing. We were honored to be a part of it, and we're looking forward to doing it again!

## COOHIO NEWS CLIPS

Full-time workers must earn more than \$20 per hour to afford a two-bedroom apartment, according to a new report from the National Low Income Housing Coalition and the Coalition on Homelessness and Housing in Ohio. That's more than \$40,000 a year. And, there's a large gap between renters' income and the cost of rent, according to the report... "Wages for Ohio's most common jobs have increased significantly since the pandemic," Ohio Coalition Executive Director Amy Riegel said in a media release. "Employers are trying to keep pace with inflation, but the skyrocketing cost of rent has effectively erased these wage gains, putting affordable homes out of reach for a large swath of Ohio's workforce."
