Linda's Letter

Sometimes all it takes is a pair of shoes....

Let me explain. As you are aware, Family Promise of Warren County (FPWC) has had the pleasure for almost 27 years to provide a program of accountability and responsibility as we work with families every day to achieve sustainable independence, self-sufficiency and housing through a community-based response. This is inclusive of an individualized case plan and daily case manager visits that recognize the specific and individual needs of each family.

We are currently blessed to work with families with a total of 14 children here in shelter. In our eyes, it is heartbreaking to see the challenges these children face. They are happy children. They love our playground. They love riding bikes and using sidewalk chalk with our volunteers. They enjoy meals such as spaghetti, grilled cheese, and hot dogs! Ice cream for dessert brings laughter and giggles. Our volunteers are loving and attentive and, like most of us grandparents, the volunteers are exhausted when they go home;

but know that they have positively impacted a child.

These children come to us with tattered clothing, sometime mismatched and often too big or too small. No socks, and shoes with ties that are too long or too short and all too many times with holes in them or so used that they are filthy.

We recently took these children to a local "free store" so that they could shop with mom for their basic needs. Oh, I wish you could have seen the smiles when they arrived for dinner that night in their "new" clothing, feeling so good.

But sometimes it is all about shoes. We were blessed with a couple of gift cards to Kohls and decided to use them for shoes for these children. Our staff packed the children up in our van and off they went to Kohls in their battered shoes and wearing new socks from our Coats for a Cause closet.

Two hours later, as these children came off the van, I immediately noticed a change. We had happy and smiling children. They had never been to Kohls and never had brand new shoes. Haley

got purple, shimmering, light up shoes. Paula, the oldest of the children, had very teenage shoes and Harlin, our 10-yearold boy, proudly showed me his Nikes which provided support to his ankles as he has cerebral palsy.

I teased Harlin about how big his feet were and how great these shoes were. His smile said it all. He told me that he felt much taller! At dinner that night, the children were so excited to show the volunteers their new shoes. There was a change in them. A positive change. A change in their attitudes.

Sometimes, all it takes is a pair of shoes....and the love and interest of strangers that provide the basic needs that we all take for granted.

Matthew 25: 35-36 shares "For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat. I was thirty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger, and you invited me in. I needed clothes and you clothed me. I was sick and you looked after me. I was in prison, and you came to visit me."

As a volunteer and supporter of FPWC, you follow Matthew 25. I see it every day with volunteers from congregations, business, clubs, schools and more who

come to the FPWC campus with food, and smiles, and encouragement, and time and love. I see the hugs that our kiddos receive and give. I see the pats on the back for our parents and the kind words that mean more than you will ever know. 


I didn't know what to do or where to start. I went from having somebody to help with my children and didn't need as much assistance because I could work and work as much as I needed. Then that was just gone. I didn't have much support and didn't know where to start. When we lost our housing, I tried to stay in hotels but couldn't keep up with the cost as I no longer had childcare and couldn't keep a job. I tried to stay with family but could never stay long. I was at a loss. I knew I had to do something for myself and especially my three children. Then my sister-in-law recommended I call IHNWC (now FPWC). She shared with me that she had heard good things about FPWC so I called. And I'm so grateful that I did.

FPWC made it possible to have support. The case management with Nichole was great. It made things easier to accomplish the goals I needed to be as successful as I could be. The rest was up to me but having the steps, the tools and all the guidance was so helpful. I was able to get childcare, food stamps, employment, and housing. The support from the church volunteers

was unforgettable. Many watched the children to give us parents in the program a break, we had dessert every night and just being able to talk to the volunteers meant so much. LifeHouse was our favorite church because they did haircuts and family pictures.

Initially after shelter we were living in a unit getting help from a temporary housing program which FPWC connected us to. FPWC later helped us move into a unit with a permanent housing program. We have been in that unit for four years now. It hasn't always been easy but the continued support we receive from FPWC keeps us going. I'm proud to say I work full-time and have been at my current job for two years. During that time, I've been promoted to a lead with the company, and I aspire to be the COO of the company someday. I started schooling for a Bachelors in Operations Management in June 2025. Having that degree will help me further my career. I honestly can say I wouldn't be where I am today without the help, support and generosity of all involved with FPWC.

COHHIO News Clips

Full-time workers need to earn at least \$22.51/hour just to afford a modest two-bedroom apartment in Ohio, according to a report jointly released by the National Low Income Housing Coalition and the Coalition on Homelessness and Housing in Ohio.

The 2025 Out of Reach report shows that the disparity between renters' income and the cost of rent in Ohio has more than doubled since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020. The average Ohio renter now earns \$18.62/hour, or \$3.89/hour less than the 2-bedroom Housing Wage. In 2020, the difference was \$1.57/hour, a gap that has increased 148% in five years.

The Housing Wage is an estimate of the hourly wage full-time workers must earn to afford a rental home at HUD's Fair Market Rent without spending more than 30% of their incomes.

The report also found that only 4 out of the 15 most common jobs in the Buckeye State pay more than the 2025 Housing Wage. That means nearly 1.2 million jobs – 21% of all the jobs in Ohio – don't pay enough to afford a basic two-bedroom apartment.

The Notre Dame (ND) Club of Cincinnati has been blessed with a new adventure this year, working with Family Promise of Warren County (FPWC), helping us put our faith into action. Our ND Club consists of alumni, parents, and friends from the Tri-State region of Greater Cincinnati.

Being able to spend quality time with these families and bring joy into their day and ours, I believe has been a true blessing to all of us.

As the community service leader for our club, I'm so glad FPWC found us and reached out. Of this entire experience, what I'm most grateful for is the way FPWC and the work they are doing for these families truly inspires our volunteers. Even though we have a wide variety of volunteers: college kids, families with high-schoolers, empty-nesters, and grandparents, they all love serving here and keep coming back week after week. This would be a serene place outside the chaos that homelessness brings. A place where children could be in nature and away from video screens. A place where they can harvest tomatoes, onions and pumpkins and a place where children can learn.

For the last two years FPWC has been blessed with volunteers from many places to make this vision a reality. The Master Gardener volunteers from OSU extension have been wonderful partners as we strive to achieve Doug's vision. Other gardeners soon joined the cause from Town and Country Gardeners Club, Crossroads Church, Summitt Church, and Gathering Church. These folks have constructed planter boxes and beds and have adopted planters so we now have not only beautiful flowers but an abundance of homegrown veggies.

Groups from a variety of organizations including LCNB, United Way, Gathering Church and others have spent time weeding our various beds. All so that we can provide this beautiful space of dignity for our families and the wonderful community of Lebanon in which we reside.

Our path is now becoming a reality! Through generous donations we were able to construct the 500-foot-long crushed limestone walking path. The

children are already so excited to ride their bikes and walk this path. To be out in the fresh air and to learn about their surroundings.

Our storybook display pedestals are also becoming a reality! Soon the children will be able to read our first book, "The Little Engine That Could." What an inspiring story for our families to read as the Little Blue Engine saves the day, saying "I think I can!" along the way.

Sadly, our great friend and dedicated volunteer Doug Pendery passed away on July 11. We are forever grateful for that day when Doug shared his vision. A vision that for years to come will make an impact on all who walk the path, enjoy the scent of the flowers, and are inspired by the simple but impactful books that all can read.

Fundraising Update

Early in 2025, it was evident that to survive and to thrive, Family Promise of Warren County (FPWC) would need to stepup our fundraising efforts. We had been in our new facility for a year, and we could now assess our actual costs versus our estimated costs. It was determined that in all our fundraising efforts we must raise a total of \$100,000.00 in 2025.

Being in our new facility comes with additional financial responsibilities. While FPWC has always paid for utilities, our utility bills have increased with the larger facility. There was the need for additional staffing. Furthermore, we now have a mortgage. Being in an older building comes with additional challenges. There are repairs, maintenance, groundskeeping, snow removal, and capital improvement. And with all of this we are grateful for the opportunity to be in this new facility which will bring hope to many families for years to come.


It was determined by the FPWC Board of Directors that we would organize and hold three major fundraising events in 2025.

The first, Golf Fore Home, was held on May 19th at the Heatherwoode Golf Club. This event was attended by 133 golfers. The event was sponsored by Heather's Light Foundation, Festo, Gathering Church, Summit United Methodist Church, and many others that supported golf carts and holes. We were so grateful for the support! We had a beautiful day and in all raised a total of \$27,618. We hope you can join us in 2026!

The second event was the 19th annual Run4Home 5K and Kid's Fun Run held on July 4th at Armco Park. With a total of 369 participants this event raised a total of \$16,669.94. We are looking forward to our 20th annual Run4 Home in 2026!

The final fundraising event will be Tailgate for Home. This will be held Sunday, October 5th at the Manor House in Mason from 3:30p to 7:30p. We want this to be a fun and high energy event with the dress code being jeans and your favorite team's shirt. Tailgate food will be served such as chicken wings, sliders, cheese coneys, and meatballs. The Bengals vs Detroit Lions will be on the big screens. There will be raffles, silent auction, a wine pull, bourbon pull, football throw, a cornhole tournament and more!
