Linda's Letter

A couple of weeks ago, while heading to the mailbox, I ran into one of our many volunteers. This volunteer was busy working the Storybook Garden Path, picking raspberries and enjoying the beautiful day.

This gal approached me, and we chatted for a few moments. She shared with me how sorry she was that she had not had much time to volunteer this year and mostly "only watered" when she had time. I was taken back by her apology and assured her that her contribution was amazing and much needed. I shared how appreciative I was for all that she had done. And with that, I started to think about all the volunteers that make Family Promise of Warren County (FPWC) work. How many of our volunteers feel bad about what they "only" could do???

Since even before we opened this organization back in October 1998 that small group of volunteers collectively spent many hours creating what is now FPWC. Their hearts were in family homelessness and how to give a child a future. I am

sure that in that group there were folks who wish that they could have done more. There were and are no apologies needed as we have grown from just 8 congregations to more than 60 organizations that provide food, fellowship and overnight for families in the crisis of homelessness.

Volunteers and supporters together helped FPWC to raise more than \$56,000 needed funds through attendance at our Golf Fore Home, Run4Home 5K and our Tailgate for Home. And at each function, I did hear from these wonderful supporters as I thanked them, "I wish I could have done more". Let me assure you. Every day, I am touched by the hearts and spirit of each volunteer who take time out of their day to love those that we are called to love.

A few weeks ago, Mike had provided a wonderful meal of chicken, mac and cheese and green beans. We had a new group of families and the FPWC type of hospitality was new to them. Mike sat with the families during dinner and made them feel so comfortable.

The other volunteer, also a Mike, spent time with a mother of three and as she shared, made her feel so comfortable with her decision to come to FPWC.

After dinner everyone went out to play and after a while, the families were invited back to David's Place to enjoy a craft. Everyone happily went on to the Day Center except for three-year-old Preston. Preston did not want to go inside. He wanted to play. And play he did. Mike stayed outside with little Preston. They kicked a ball, they played, and more importantly, little Preston was provided with the love and attention that he needed at that time.

"Only". I hope that our volunteers never use this word in a negative way. If you "only" provided food, you fed someone who was hungry. If you "only" stayed overnight, you provided our families with security. If you "only" attended a fundraiser, you allowed FPWC

the funds to pay our staff, keep our doors open, and make much needed repairs to the campus. And, if you "only" played outside with a three-year-old, you made him feel loved. There are no "only's" at FPWC. There is so much appreciation for all that you do and will do.

As we move into 2026, FPWC has plans to increase our reach into the community. We will open our next six rooms as we build our network of congregations, organizations, and business. We will bring more families out of the crisis of homelessness and into the security of housing. And we will do this with each of you by our side.

This holiday season and always, I share my heartfelt thanks to all of our volunteers and supporters. You are now and have always been our foundation. Thank you!



Stories of Promise

Life for us before FPWC was rough. Alan and I started our family at the ages of 15 and 17. We were very lucky at that age to have a ton of support in helping starting to raise a child. As years went by, and one bad decision after another left us with no where else to turn to for help but FPWC. At that point, we finally realized we were as low as you get and we had to get fix it.

Honestly, I started researching closest homeless shelters to me and I went from there. I had heard that there was one in Lebanon before but we knew nothing about it or how any of it worked. The one thing that stood out to me the most is that everything there treated us like regular people. Not dirty people or bad people or bad parents, just regular people. That feeling alone, of true humanity lit a fire in our soul like nothing else ever could. We knew right then we had a fighting chance.

Our experience while in the shelter was truly amazing and nothing you would ever expect when you think of a shelter. While as we were staying in churches

during our time there, that also had some pretty amazing upsides. Every church had a huge gym that all the kids loved. They played dodge-ball, basketball, Uno and us adults were involved also. Some of volunteers would sit and talk and joke with us like we were all best friends. Also, the food was always amazing. Amazing people doing amazing things for complete strangers. Angels among us just like the song.

Fast forward to today, our lives are completely crazy but in a good way. We still live in the same two bedroom apartment we moved out of FPWC into almost 7 years ago. We also now rent a garage from our landlord to keep our 2025 Harley Davidson Road Glide in. Alan is a city driver for Saia LTL Freight and has been with them now for almost 7 years. I (Brandy) recently left my job at Hot Head Burritos of 6 years and became a full time DoorDasher. Kendra is now 17 and a senior in high school and is in the Cosmetology program at the Warren County Career Center. She also works at a salon in town. Eleanore is now 12 in the 6th grade and is currently a cheerleader for Lebanon 6th grade White.

We have continued to push ourselves to bigger and better goals and dreams and we never lose sight of where we started. We make better decisions and fight and strive to be better each and every single day and we always give FPWC credit for the time and effort that they put into our family. Nothing was ever easy, but this is proof that hard work does pay off.



1. What do you usually do to volunteer for FPWC? Which is your favorite?

For the past many years (at least 12 years) I have been honored to lead a Christmas project for the families of FPWC. With the great help from St. Patrick's Episcopal Church and the Family Montessori School next door to the Church, which is led by Tina Evans, we have been able to provide a great Christmas for the many families who are in this program. The Christmas project started many years ago with the youth group that I taught at St. Patrick's. The project took off as a great success and has continued to be a wonderful project. Each Christmas we buy warm coats, hats, and gloves for each family member as well as many gifts for each of the kids in the FPWC program. Personally, it is truly a rewarding experience to know that all these kids and their parents will have a wonderful Christmas as a result of this project. I am so fortunate to have so many people to help me with making this program successful.

2. How did you first get involved in FPWC?

I first got involved through St. Patrick's Church by volunteering to spend the night with the families from Interfaith Hospitality. I had a chance to get to see the needs that these families had as they spent the night at our church. It touched my heart to see the kids and the circumstances that they were experiencing from being homeless. I also got to know Linda Rabolt and witnessed the wonderful work she and her staff did to help these families.

3. What is your "why" for volunteering?

I have always felt that it is so important to help those in need. I want Christmas to be a special day for all these families. It warms my heart to know that each individual in these families will get the opportunity to experience God's love on this special day. The mission statement in our Episcopal Church was to take the love of Christ into our world. This gives me and many others that opportunity. It is an honor for me personally to be involved in this project.

1. How long have you been a member of the staff of FPWC? What is your position? Tell us a little about what you do and your educational background.

Coordinator Corner

Crossroads Mason is one of several satellite campuses for the main Crossroads Church location in Oakley. We embrace the idea of Christians being born for adventure and display this belief in many mission and outreach opportunities. We GO to our surrounding communities and globally to serve because God calls us to act, and blesses us with the ability to do so.

Crossroads Mason originally started serving with FPWC as partners with Heritage Presbyterian Church, in May 2020, by hosting Friday evenings during their week of service. As we broadened our volunteer base we chose to host weeks on our own. In 2025, we started by hosting 2 weeks and also were able to supplement additional days when asked by FPWC. Our volunteer base has continued to grow and we have committed to hosting 4 weeks in 2026!

In addition to hosting weeks of service providing meals, evening, and overnight hosts, multiple groups from our Crossroads community have participated in projects with FPWC. Groups have helped set up, organize and label items in the kitchen before opening the new campus and have worked alongside the Love Like JJ organization to build the Gaga Pit, install the basketball hoop, library box, and benches. The past 2 years during Crossroads GoCincy day we put together the raised beds, spread mulch, weeded and set the posts for the Storybook Garden. We later partnered with John Cecere, leader of Christians

in Action, to set additional posts for the garden. Currently, Crossroads is gathering supplies for the FPWC Christmas wish list.

It was a privilege to be one of the many sponsors in the Run4Home 5K (and to participate alongside runners/walkers from our Crossroads community)! In addition, with generous donations from our volunteers, we were able to provide a raffle basket at the inaugural Tailgate for Home fundraiser (which was a nicely attended event to promote support for FPWC).

This past summer Crossroads collected 8-10 bikes for the children and parents to ride on campus. Seeing them enjoy riding the bikes warms our hearts. The children found such joy in being able to just be kids. FPWC has such a heart for the children and our volunteers enjoy coming to spend time with the families each evening. This summer our volunteers enjoyed playing tag and football, drawing pictures with sidewalk chalk, doing crafts, and having a water night with the children and parents. We find the families are always so appreciative of meals provided, evening activities and assistance received by the program.

We have been so impressed with how Linda, staff and board have grown this mission to help support families. We pray for God's guidance in discovering other ways to serve and are so thankful to everyone at FPWC for all the work they do and pray Jesus continues blessing the families supported by all of us.



Storybook Garden Path

The Storybook Garden Path area at Family Promise of Warren County (FPWC) has taken great strides this year. What fills us with awe is how many hands go into implementing the vision. Project lead Tom Ludeke installed the first book in 20 stations: The Little Engine That Could. Not only is this a favorite with a message that never gets old, but 2025 is its 95th anniversary. Tom also oversaw the installation of paths made with crushed limestone. The Master Gardener Volunteers of Warren County (MGers) augmented the existing plantings from last year with MGer supplied and nurtured Williamsburg, VA, hollyhock seeds as well as MGer grown woody plants (sweet bay magnolia, buttonbush and red twig dogwood) that have thrived.

The front beds were aided by the self-seeding of orange cosmos and dill as well as overwintered dahlias. In fact, the dill and cosmos seeded so freely that there were plenty for packets to be used by FPWC. We are grateful for a number of large volunteer groups who came with some regularity to help with weeding and mulching. Certain weeds, such as couch grass, alas were persistent invaders. Volunteers from Crossroads Church and Festo were also a tremendous help with the display pedestals and pergola.

After the paths were installed, Tom and several MGers selected eight

woody plants from Grandma's Gardens with the intent of providing more shade and building screening. Using drone images provided by Tom, MGers created a layout for the new plant materials. Grandma's Gardens gave a much appreciated discount on both the new trees and shrubs and the installation that took place on October 9th.

In the back, the Toddler Playground plantings have thrived. The area is now completely planted with the addition of Raydon's Favorite asters. The 'Holy Grail' hardy hibiscus and 'Fireworks' goldenrod have put on a particularly beautiful show.

Plans for the rest of this year and next include making sure that the new woody plants get a good start in life with regular watering. Installation of a new pergola with built-in benches should be done soon and the MGers will be planning best plantings to provide shade and beauty. Lastly, a few more 'Mr. Bowling Ball' arborvitae are planned to soften some path corners. Thanks go to the full crew of MGer regulars who contribute in so many ways: Mindy Hoffbauer, Janet Maney, Elaine Sharp, Sandi Thompson, Jane Titus, Patty Tkatschenko, and Deb Wiater. Thanks also go to the Town & Country Garden Club and the Litsey family, tenders of the raised bed gardens that have provided beautiful flowers and seasonal produce!


